Community Services Report

** The Beaver-Lawrence
Central Labor Council lost a dedicated member recently. His
name is Alex de la Cruz. Most
current members of the Labor
Council did not know Alex and
the contributions that he made to
the Labor Council and our community and country.

Alex was a quiet guy, but his actions were huge. He was a retired member of the United Steelworkers Local 1212 who had been employed by Crucible Steel in Midland.

When I began serving as a Labor Council delegate and was given the job as the Community Services Chairperson, one of my duties was to help set up for the for the Labor Council's annual craft show. Joe Spanik, who was the Labor Liaison for the Beaver County United Way, introduced me to Alex. The two of us were going to set up the signs for the craft show, which at the time was located at the Beaver County Community College Dome.

Setting up the signs was not an easy task back then because the signs were 4x4 plywood, mounted on a 2x4 skids, with sandbags holding them in place. We set up approximately 15 signs around Beaver County, and course, after the show, we dissembled them.

Throughout the years Alex was always there to help setting up signs and pitch in whenever the Community Ser-

vices Committee and Labor Council needed help.

Alex was also a volunteer for the American Red Cross. He worked at many disasters caused by hurricanes, tornados, and floods. Alex was always someone that you could count on and will be missed.

** At the present time, there are many Unions striking across the country. They are fed up with corporate

greed and corporate greed and corporations that do not share their success with the very people who are responsible for their profits. One strike is of particular concern – that of 1400 workers at four Kellogg Corporation plants, including one plant in Pennsylvania located in Lancaster.

The workers are represented by the Bakery, Confectionary, Tobacco Workers and Grain Millers International Union (BCTGM) Local 374G. They walked out on October 5th.

A tentative agreement with a 3% wage increase with incentive to

earn more was overwhelming rejected by the rank and file in a vote held on December 5th. The main complaint centered around a two-tier wage system. Kellogg then announced that it will hire permanent replacement workers (scabs).

Let us support the members of Local 374 G. Please tell all your friends and fellow workers to not buy Kellogg's products. ** On a positive note, a Starbucks in the Buffalo area voted to form a Union. They are the first of 9,000 locations to be unionized.
