## STRIKING PITTSBURGH NEWSGUILD REPRESENTATIVES ADDRESS BEAVER-LAWRENCE CLC MEMBERSHIP

*[Editor's note: Andrew Goldstein, Pittsburgh NewsGuild-CWA Post-Gazette Unit delegate chair, and Lou Grieco, NewsGuild-CWA staff representative, addressed the delegates attending the Beaver Lawrence CLC delegate's meeting on November 21<sup>st</sup>. On October 18<sup>th</sup> NewsGuild journalists employed by the Post-Gazette joined the strike of Post-Gazette production workers that began on October 1<sup>st</sup>. The delegates approved a \$300 donation to the Pittsburgh Strikers Fund and will entertain a solidarity resolution at the December membership meeting supporting the striking employees. Below is Andrew Goldstein's November 25<sup>th</sup> submission to the UNION BUG reiterating the main points that he and Lou Grieco made at the November 21<sup>st</sup> delegate's meeting.]*

About 120 workers among the unions have participated in an unfair

labor practice strike for more than a month over a variety of issues, including the illegal elimination of health care, bad faith bargaining, illegal and unilateral declaration of impasse and imposition of

unacceptable work conditions, and illegal surveillance of union activities. (There is currently a case moving through the NLRB on these charges).

The union workers, who are responsible for making the PG the top media outlet in the state and one of the best in the country, have not had a

contract since the last one expired in 2017. Since then, the Block family has spent millions of dollars on union-busting Nashville, Tenn., law firm King and Ballow in a direct effort to break the PG's decades-old unions.

Despite years of good faith bargaining by the unions, the PG has refused to move an inch off of its initial contract proposal that strips away some of the most basic union protections by eliminating job security, seniority, the guarantee of a five day work week, and guaranteed health care.

The PG is owned by the Block family of Toledo, Ohio, as part of a larger corporation, Block Communications Inc. BCI, which also owns the Blade of Toledo, Buckeye Broadband and numerous other subsidiaries around the country, makes more than \$100 million a year **in profit** for the Block family.

\* Post-Gazette strike continues – Members of CWA Locals 14842 and 14827, Teamsters Local 205/211 and Pressmen's Union CCC/IBT Local 24M/9N employed by the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette remain on strike. They are employed journalists and design, production, distribution and advertising workers. The strike began as a response to the Post-Gazette's termination of its production employee's health care coverage on October 1<sup>st</sup>. \* Delta Flight Attendants organizing – Delta Flight attendants are building a Flight Attendant Union with AFA-CWA. Delta served 616,000 passengers at Pittsburgh International Airport between August 2021



and July 2022.

\* Solidarity with Starbucks Workers United – Starbucks workers rallied against corporate bullying and union busting on December 9<sup>th</sup> in Pittsburgh's Market Square. Approximately 7,000 Starbucks workers have organized nationwide since the first Starbucks store voted to unionize on December 9, 2021. Instead of meeting workers at the bargaining table, Starbucks has fired more than 150 workers and closed stores. The unions' demands to end the strike are simple and clear: Return to the conditions of our contract that expired in 2017, bargain in good faith on successor agreements with the unions, and restore the health care that was illegally eliminated.

Until that occurs, the unions are calling for a total reader and advertising boycott of the PG. If you have a subscription, we ask that you cancel it. If you know a business that advertises in the PG, ask it to stop. If you are approached by a PG scab reporter, refuse to talk to them.

Although they are on

# A Message From PA AFL-CIO President Angela Ferritto

***A message from The Pennsylvania AFL-CIO President Angela Ferritto regarding the 2022 Midterm Election. (11/09/22)***

When union members, women and young people vote, this is what happens – principled candidates focused on strengthening public education, health care, job security, and rights of working people win. Why? Because the priorities of the candidates endorsed by the PA AFL-CIO reflect the values of the people who are the backbone of our state.
